



### AWQ 2015 Frequently Asked Questions

#### When will this year's competition be?

Academic WorldQuest will be held on Wednesday, November 18th at the Hilton Charlotte Center City (222 E. Third St., Charlotte, NC 28202).

A light spaghetti buffet dinner will be served that evening from 6:00 – 7:00 p.m. The competition will promptly begin at 7:15 p.m. with opening remarks followed by eight rounds of questions.

#### How do I choose a team?

This is entirely up to you as the primary AWQ Coach at your school. The team may consist of students you have in class or students may refer other interested students to you.

#### What some coaches did to put a team together?

- I recruited from students I taught.
- I recruited students who were already participating (or interested) in Model UN.
- I informed the students of the competition and actively recruited.
- I spoke with the social studies department and got players from the social studies classes.
- I chose students from last year plus advertised over the morning announcements. Kids tell others.
- Engaged kids are interested in this; I sent out a note to the social studies teachers for potential students.



- My students are seniors from my yearbook staff. In the past, I used seniors from my AP European class, but (this year) I thought I would try using students from another environment.
- I chose my students based on their performance in my IB 12th grade class, particularly their participation in our current events discussions.
- I asked other teachers to send a list of students who they thought would enjoy the competition and who could be dedicated to it. From that list, I talked to the students personally and was able to get about 10 kids interested.
- We had an assessment/test to see who would be on the WorldQuest team. I put together a test based on questions from years past and took the top nine scorers.
- I had an interest meeting. If 8 or fewer showed up, that was our team. If more, a qualifying current events test and an essay piece would be part of the selection process.

### How do I prepare a team for competition?

Coaches have different ways of preparing their teams. Choose the format that works best for you and your students.

### What did some coaches do to prepare?

- We met once a week for four weeks. The week of the competition we meet twice during lunch period. I found websites (and suggested that they do the same) and encouraged them to take practice quizzes online. I also directed them to certain media outlets (The Economist, CNN, BBC, etc.) I also broke them into regions, where each kid becomes a specialist on that particular region in terms of flags, geography, people, etc.
- The quiz team met during a scheduled club day, basically once a week. We reviewed the categories and students volunteered to be the go-to person for that category. We did not have group study sessions because the students are involved in many extra-curricular activities. For that reason, the quiz bowl is done on an individual basis.
- The students met and planned strategy. Each took a category. We communicated by email and met only three times.
- This is a student-led and student-directed activity. I met with them twice but the students met as a group themselves.
- They split up the categories and a student led the group.
- The student group organized a Facebook group page and prepped questions online.

### How many students may participate in a team?

Competing teams consists of eight students from each high school.

### How many teams can each high school send to Academic WorldQuest 2015?

Each high school may send one team (8-students) to represent their school in AWQ 2015.

If a second HIGH SCHOOL team is interested in participating, they can compete in WorldQuest 2015, which is the community version of the competition. Please note that there is an additional cost (\$400 per team) to participate in the WorldQuest 2014. ### Is there a cost to compete in Academic WorldQuest 2015?

There is an **OPTIONAL \$ 50 registration fee** for each participating high school team for AWQ 2015. Details are included in your registration form. The optional fee helps the WACC with some of the costs associated with organizing Academic WorldQuest.

### What do the students think of the event?

This is one of the WACC's most rewarding programs because the students really do have a great time with their peers while participating in an academic competition geared toward showcasing their knowledge of the world in a fun and engaging way.

**What do the students win?**

Top teams receive Barnes & Noble gift cards and medals.

**How many teams play?**

Last year 24 teams from Mecklenburg, Union County, Gaston, Iredell and Cabarrus County schools participated. We have the ability to host up to eight additional schools.

**What do the coaches do during the competition?**

You get to play! We set up three teams for you (coaches) to relax and have some fun during the event.

**Are parents and guests allowed to attend the competition?**

We typically don't encourage the attendance of guests and parents due to space limitation at the hotel. For your knowledge, the ballroom is set-up for anywhere from 500-600 people (round tables with 8-seats). In addition, dinner is only served for participants (and coaches) competing in the Academic WorldQuest and WorldQuest.

While we would like to accommodate viewers, we have to be mindful of space, cost and logistical issues associated with a program this scale.
